Together we are able to gain strength and make good decisions on behalf of our people. I also acknowledge the leadership of each Taiwhenua and also each marae across the Kahungunu rohe and those marae outside of our rohe where our Kahungunu whānau meet. Collectively we can prosper and enhance our opportunities for iwi development as we continue to strengthen ourselves and our whānau and hapū; protect our environment; retain our cultural identity; and strengthen healthy relationships as we participate in and make our mark in our ever changing world.

I have always seen my role as a Kaumātua representative on the Board as one who will offer advice around tikanga and kawa to ensure our Kahungunu practices are upheld. My aspiration for the iwi continues to focus on strengthening the paepae to ensure our marae are healthy and active. I encourage all Kaumātua to sit alongside the younger generation of tane to awhi and guide them as they learn and step up into their roles.

Ngāti Kahungunu has taken giant steps toward increasing the health and vibrancy of its people through supporting cultural and sporting events such as the New Zealand Māori Rugby Centenary Game which involved 500 strong vibrant rangatahi who made Kahungunu proud in all ways possible during their haka performance at the NZ Māori vs England game held in Napier on the 23rd June 2010. I strongly believe that we need to look after our younger generation and awhi them as they grow into their leadership roles. Now more than ever, our tamarii and mokopuna need our guidance. Kahungunu has always been known as an iwi manaaki. Let us manaaki our whānau into the future.

Matariki Shines Brightly In Tamatea

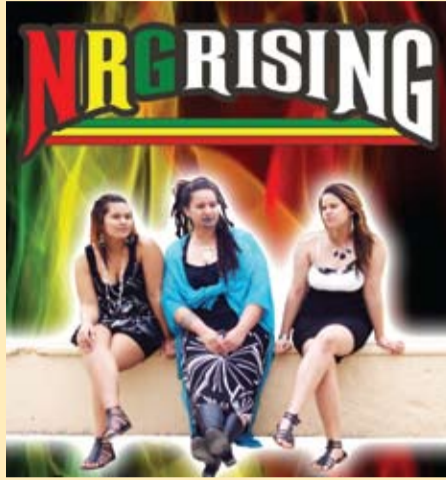

LIVING LONGER FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi supports strong, vibrant, healthy whānau and hapū.

"We want our parents and grandparents to live longer so they can nurture and nourish their future generations for the wellbeing of the whole nation".

In May 2010 the Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi Incorporated Board endorsed a 'Ngāti Kahungunu Tobacco Free Strategy' with the hope of a longer brighter future. Iwi Chairman Ngāhiwi Tomoana who also sits on the Hawke's Bay District Health Board said that he is aware of the health implications from the heavy predominance of Māori who smoke especially Māori women. Recent statistics show that over 50% of pregnant Māori women are smokers. This is a crime against our future generations and is an example of why Ngāti Kahungunu has adopted a tobacco free strategy for the whole rohe.

There is no doubt that this is a sensitive issue and even though puffs of doubt may cloud an affirmative way forward, the iwi is planning to act carefully and instead of extolling the negatives of smoking we will illuminate the positives of not smoking.

One of the greatest positives of 'not smoking' is that mokopuna will clearly have the advantage of having grandparents and great grandparents that don't exist now. What a great gift to any whānau! Statistics show that for over the past forty years Māori men and women have died between the ages of 55-64 years compared to our pakeha counterparts who live on average 10-15 years longer. Just think of the transfer of knowledge, tikanga, kawa, aroha and manaaki from a grandparent to their grandchildren as they grow well into their 30's, 40's and 50's.

Wānanga will be at the forefront to encourage whānau to give up smoking but there are other processes to be engaged as well. The iwi plans to approach all tobacco retail outlets, petrol stations and corner dairies within the Kahungunu rohe to remove tobacco displays from their outlets as this is a major magnet for young budding minds. Retailers will be made aware of why this campaign is vital for increasing Māori longevity.

Ngāti Kahungunu is realistic enough to know that things will not happen immediately but we want a slow moving affect so that over the next 10 years smoking will be minimal amongst our people. A Ngāti Kahungunu Tobacco Action Group has been formed to work through an action plan. Kahungunu and NZ Māori Win At Stunning Celebration

to mark 100 years of māori rugby

Ngaahiwi Tomoana, Chair of Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi was approached by Wayne Peters, Māori Member on the NZ Rugby Union Board, for Kahungunu to host a full banquet to celebrate 100 years of Māori Rugby. Although the NZ Rugby Union ended up giving the banquet to another contractor, Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi provided manaakitanga to the fullest extent, facilitating a pōwhiri for the NZ Māori team, the England team, the NZRU Māori Committee and the NZRU Board. In the process Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi Inc. accomplished a number of unplanned achievements:

- We had a 500 strong pre-game kapa haka group, the biggest ever for an international rugby game;
- We had our own Kahungunu announcer - Meagan Chong who became the first bi-lingual ground announcer for an NZRU game;
- It was the first time that two anthem singers from the same iwi were selected, Hinewehi Mohi and Charles Ropitini, both Ngāti Kahungunu; and
- We were the first iwi to organise pre-game fireworks, half time and after game entertainment at an international rugby game.

Julie says that her passion is to encourage rangatahi and show how it is possible to aspire and work hard to achieve your goals.

Julie is actively involved in the community health sector. Her main field is in helping our Māori whānau to stop smoking. Wherever she goes, she is always advocating good health messages to the community. Julie runs workshops that promote goal setting. She has a passion to promote Māori achievement in all areas of life. Recently Julie put her name down to compete in a charity boxing match to increase the awareness of Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD). While boxing is out of her comfort zone she is keen to support the cause.

MERE WHAANGA

Ko Taumutu te maunga
Ko Mangatahi te moana
Ko Mangapoike te awa
Ko Ngāi Tahu Matawhaiti te hapū
Ko Iwitea te marae.



Mere Whaanga is a mother of three, grandmother of three, and kaitiaki of whānau land and the korero associated with it. Having completed two years as Māori History Fellow in Wellington, Mere moved home to Mahia at the end of 2003. Her hapū history A Carved Cloak for Tahu was published the following year and was a finalist in the History section of the Montana New Zealand Book Awards in 2005.

When asked by her son what had happened to his grandfather's farm Rata, Mere decided to approach the Māori Land Court to see if the farm could be returned to whānau ownership. Rata and several other Tutuotekaha blocks were amalgamated with Anewa Station in 1967.

The response from the Land Court was not encouraging. Mere applied to Waikato University to become a PhD candidate in the School of Māori and Pacific Development with part of her study coming under the School of Law. Her aim was to better understand Te Ture Whenua Māori Act 1993 and also to examine the progression of Māori land from traditional tenure, through small whānau holdings, to the large trusts and incorporations that dominate so much of Māori land in the Ngāti Kahungunu ki Wairoa area.

She began her full-time PhD study in August 2007. The working title of her thesis is "Rata – Traditional practice to agricultural shareholding".

The research Mere will undertake, and her PhD study as a whole is aligned with the Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi Strategic Vision 2026 which expresses as "Ki te whai ao, ki te ao mārama – The continuous pursuit of excellence"

Mere is a mature student who embarked on this study at the age of 55. Once the PhD is completed she hopes to continue on to post-doctoral research in the area of sustainable Māori land utilization, an area that will be very useful to many of our hapū who are land-rich, but increasingly dissociated from their lands.

Mere's PhD is about Māori land law, land tenure and traditional ecological knowledge and is of great interest to the iwi. Te Tiriti o Waitangi, whakapapa connections to the land, the way our tupuna worked with the land and its resources, how we maintain our connections with ancestral land now, and the way we interact with other peoples will be examined in the PhD.

hapū rohe moana, awa, waiā management - planning wānanga

'KOTAHITANGA' Hapū working together on collective aspirations and developing outcomes for the benefit of us all.

In the last edition of Hōea rā we profiled the Kahungunu ki Uta, Kahungunu ki Tai Marine and Freshwater strategy. Since then we have sent out our first Fish Unit Newsletter- Hurumanu and we have held the first of a series of wānanga. These wānanga are an opportunity for hapū to come together on collective aspirations and develop outcomes for the benefit of us all. The first wānanga held at Matahiwi marae was a great success and a draft hapū rohe moana/awaiwāiu management plan template has been developed. This template is available for all hapū to review and modify before the next wānanga in the series. To request a copy of this template, please contact our office. Wānanga tuarua will provide the opportunity for hapū to confirm and ratify the planned framework and will be held on 24th – 25th September (venue to be confirmed); other items on the agenda include LORE – Tikanga and the Treaty of Waitangi, and co-ownership/ co-management. Wānanga tatoru is planned for 3rd - 4th December, venue and agenda to be confirmed. The wānanga series will finish with a Kahungunu ki Uta, Kahungunu ki Tai summit in March 2011.
